The Mayor previously served as guest band director for the West High School band during the Sept. 25 game against Hardin Valley Academy and hopes to attend several playoff games as well.

"I love football, but I really love seeing our students in their element, performing for their friends and family, using skills they've worked hard to learn," said Mayor Jacobs.
