- **1.28** <u>VENDOR REGISTRATION:</u> Prior to the submission deadline for this solicitation, *ALL PROPOSERS MUST* be registered with the Procurement Division. #### SECTION II OBLIGATIONS, RIGHTS AND REMEDIES

These terms and conditions shall be part of the Contract. Knox County reserves the right to negotiate other terms and conditions it deems appropriate and necessary under the circumstances to protect the public's trust.

- 2.1 <u>ALTERATIONS OR AMENDMENTS:</u> No alterations, amendments, changes, modifications or additions to this Contract shall be binding on Knox County without the prior written approval of the County.
- 2.2 <u>APPROPRIATION:</u> In the event no funds are appropriated by Knox County for the goods or services in any fiscal year, or insufficient funds exist to purchase the goods or services, then the Contract shall expire upon the expenditure of previously appropriated funds or the end of the current fiscal year, whichever occurs first, with no further obligations owed to or by either party.
- **2.3** <u>ASSIGNMENT:</u> Contractor shall not assign or sub-contract this agreement, its obligations or rights hereunder to any party, company, partnership, incorporation or person without the prior written specific consent of Knox County.
- 2.4 <u>BOOKS AND RECORDS:</u> Vendor shall maintain all books, documents, accounting records and other evidence pertaining to the goods and services provided under this Contract and make such materials available at its offices at all reasonable times during the Contract period and for three (3) years from the date of the final payment under this agreement for inspection by County or by any other governmental entity or agency participating in the funding of this agreement, or any authorized agents thereof; copies of said records to be furnished, if requested. Such records shall not include those books, documents and accounting records that represent the Vendor's costs of manufacturing, acquiring or delivering the products and services governed by this agreement.
- **2.5** CHILD LABOR: Contractor agrees that no products or services will be provided or performed under this Contract that have been manufactured or assembled by child labor.
- 2.6 <u>COMPLIANCE WITH ALL LAWS:</u> Contractor is assumed to be familiar with and agrees to observe and comply with all federal, state, and local laws, statutes, ordinances, and regulations in any manner affecting the provision of goods and/or services, and all instructions and prohibitive orders issued regarding this work and shall obtain all necessary permits.
- 2.7 <u>DEFAULT:</u> If Contractor fails to perform or comply with any provision of this Contract or the terms or conditions of any documents referenced and made a part hereof, Knox County may terminate this Contract, in whole or in part, and may consider such failure or noncompliance a breach of Contract. Knox County expressly retains all its rights and remedies provided by law in case of such breach, and no action by Knox County shall constitute a waiver of any such rights or remedies. In the event of termination for default, Knox County reserves the right to purchase its requirements elsewhere, with or without competitive solicitation.
- 2.8 <u>GOVERNING LAW; VENUE:</u> This agreement shall be exclusively construed, governed, and controlled by the Laws of the State of Tennessee without regard to principles of law, including conflicts of law, of any other jurisdiction, territory, country, and/or province. Any dispute arising out of or relating to this agreement shall exclusively be brought in the Chancery Court or the Circuit Court of Knox County, Tennessee. Each party consents to personal jurisdiction thereto and waives any defenses base on personal jurisdiction, venue and inconvenient form.
- **2.9 INCORPORATION:** All specifications, drawings, technical information, Request for Proposals, Proposal, Award and similar items referred to or attached or which are the basis for this Contract are deemed incorporated by reference as if set out fully herein.
- 2.10 <u>INDEMNIFICATION—HOLD HARMLESS:</u> Contractor shall indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless Knox County, its officers, agents and employees from all suits, claims, actions or damages of any nature brought because of, arising out of, or due to breach of the agreement by Contractor, its subcontractors, suppliers, agents, or employees or due to any negligent act or occurrence or any omission or commission of Contractor, its subcontractors, suppliers, agents or employees.
- 2.11 **INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR:** Contractor shall acknowledge that it and its employees serve as independent contractors and that Knox County shall not be responsible for any payment, insurance or incurred liability.

- 2.12 **INSPECTION AND ACCEPTANCE:** Warranty periods shall not commence until Knox County inspects and formally accepts the goods and/or services. The terms, conditions and timing of acceptance shall be determined by Knox County. Knox County reserves the right to reject any or all items or services not in conformance with applicable specifications, and Contractor assumes the costs associated with such nonconformance. Acceptance of goods or services does not constitute a waiver of latent or hidden defects or defects not readily detectable by a reasonable person under the circumstances.
- 2.13 IRAN DIVESTMENT ACT: By submission of this RFP response, each proposer and each person signing on behalf of any proposer certifies, and in the case of a joint proposal, each party thereto certifies as to its own organization, under penalty of perjury, that to the best of its knowledge and belief that each proposer is not on the list created pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated § 12-12-106. Proposers must submit with their proposals the completed Attachment C Iran Divestment Act/ No Boycott of Israel.
- 2.14 <u>LIMITATIONS OF LIABILITY:</u> In no event shall Knox County be liable for any indirect, incidental, consequential, special or exemplary damages or lost profits, even if Knox County has been advised of the possibility of such damages.
- 2.15 <u>NO BOYCOTT OF ISRAEL:</u> Pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated Title 12, Chapter 4, Part 1, by submission of a response to this solicitation, each proposer and each person signing on behalf of any proposer certifies, and in the case of a joint response each party thereto certifies as to its own organization, under penalty of perjury, that to the best of its knowledge and belief that each proposer is not currently engaged in, and will not for the duration of the contract engage in, a boycott of Israel. Proposers must submit with their proposals the completed Attachment C Iran Divestment Act/ No Boycott of Israel.
- 2.16 <u>NON-DISCRIMINATION AND NON-CONFLICT STATEMENT:</u> Contractor agrees that no person on the grounds of handicap, age, race, color, religion, sex, national origin, or any individual trait or characteristic found to be an illegal consideration, shall be excluded from participation in, or be denied benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the performance of this agreement or in the employment practices of Vendor. Contractor shall upon request show proof of such non-discrimination. Contractor covenants that it complies with the Fair Wage and Hour Laws, the National Labor Relations Act, and other federal and state employment laws as applicable. Contractor covenants that it does not engage in any illegal employment practices.

Contractor covenants that it has no public or private interest and shall not acquire directly or indirectly any interest, which would conflict in any manner with the provision of its goods or performance of its services. Contractor warrants that no part of the total contract amount provided herein shall be paid directly or indirectly to any officer or employee of Knox County as wages, compensation, or gifts in exchange for acting as officer, agent, employee, subcontractor or consultant to Contractor in connection with any goods provided or work contemplated or performed relative to the agreement.

- 2.17 ORDER OF PRECEDENCE: In the event of inconsistent or conflicting provision of this Contract and referenced documents, the following descending order of precedence shall prevail: (1) Written Contract, (2) Request for Proposals, (3) Contractor's Response, (4) Award, (5) Special Terms and Conditions, (6) General Terms and Conditions, (7) Specifications, (8) Drawings.
- **2.18** <u>**REMEDIES:**</u> Knox County shall have all rights and remedies afforded under the U.C.C. and Tennessee law in Contract and in tort, including but not limited to, rejection of goods, rescission, and right of set-off, refund, incidental, consequential and compensatory damages and reasonable attorney's fees.
- **2.19 <u><b>RIGHT TO INSPECT:**</u> Knox County reserves the right to make periodic inspections of the manner and means the service is performed or the goods are supplied and warehoused.
- **2.20** <u>SEVERABILITY:</u> If any provision of this Contract is declared illegal, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall not be affected but shall remain in force and in effect.
- 2.21 <u>TAX COMPLIANCE:</u> Pursuant to Resolution R-07-1-903 passed by the Commission of Knox County, Tennessee, Contractor hereby acknowledges, by submission of its proposal and signature, it is current in its respective federal, state, county, and city taxes of whatever kind or nature, and is not delinquent in any way. Delinquent status must be disclosed or risk debarment by the Knox County Procurement Division.

2.22 <u>TERMINATION:</u> County may terminate this agreement with or without cause at any time upon thirty (30) calendar days written notice. In the event of termination by either party, fees due for services satisfactorily performed or goods accepted prior to the termination date shall be paid. Contractor shall not perform additional work without the expressed permission of County.

In the event Contractor intends to interrupt or discontinue service under this Contract, Contractor agrees to give Knox County at least one hundred twenty (120) business day advance written notice of said interruption or discontinuance of service prior to interrupting or discontinuing same. Any interruption or discontinuance of service without said advance notice shall constitute a material breach of this Contract.

2.23 <u>WARRANTY:</u> Contractor warrants to Knox County that all items delivered and all services rendered shall conform to the specifications, drawings, proposal and/or other descriptions furnished and/or incorporated by reference, and will be fit for the particular purpose purchased, of merchantable quality, good workmanship, and free from defects. Contractor extends to Knox County all warranties allowed under the U.C.C. Contractor shall provide copies of warranties to the County upon request. Return of merchandise not meeting warranties shall be at contractor's expense.

#### SECTION III SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- **3.1 <u>INTENT:</u>** The purpose of this Request for Proposal (RFP) is to solicit one or more established providers of evidence-based numeracy intervention programs Pre-K-12 and professional development as desired by Knox County and Knox County Schools (KCS). Knox County intends to make a Best Value Award. Best Value means more than low cost. It includes the initial cost, service quality and other factors detailed herein.
- **3.2** <u>ACCEPTANCE:</u> Vendors are advised that the payment of an invoice does not necessarily constitute as an acceptance of services that are provided. Acceptance requires a specific written action by Knox County so stating.
- 3.3 <u>ADDITION OR DELETION OF SERIVICES</u>: Knox County reserves the right to add or delete services as the need arises. If services are to be added, Knox County and the Contractor will arrive at a mutually agreed price. Any additions or deletions must be approved in writing by Knox County Procurement prior to any changes in service.
- **3.4** <u>AGENCY CONTACTS</u>: The Contractor will be given a list of key personnel directly associated with the services to be performed for contact information. Only the Knox County Procurement Division will have the authority to make changes during the term of this agreement and in compliance with any resulting Contract.
- **3.5** <u>AWARD LENGTH:</u> The pricing for this Contract must remain firm for thirty-six (36) months. However, due to the funding source Knox County does not allow automatic renewals, this Contract will need to be extended annually to continue services. Knox County will draft the Extension of Contract and send it to the vendor approximately ninety (90) days before expiration. The agreement may be renewed for four (4) one-year periods upon mutual consent, for a possible total of five (5) years. Following the initial thirty-six (36) months, the Contractor may request a change in price. See Section 3.30 for requests relating to a change in price.
- **3.6** CHANGES AFTER AWARD: It is possible that after award, Knox County might change its needs or requirements. Knox County reserves the right to make such changes after consultation with the vendor. Should additional costs arise, Knox County reserves the right to consider accepting these charges provided the vendor can document the increased costs. Knox County also reserves the right to accept proposed service changes from the vendor if they will lower the cost to Knox County and/or provide improved service.
- **3.7 COMMUNICATIONS:** The successful execution of this Contract will require extensive communication between all involved parties. While information may be transmitted via telephone, it should always be followed up with an email. It is essential that the Contractor have efficient email capabilities. The Contractor will be required to submit a list of individuals, along with direct phone numbers, cell phone numbers, and email addresses for the agency's contacts. These individuals must be familiar with the Knox County Contract and have authority to make adjustments as requested by Knox County.
- **3.8** <u>COMPLIANCE WITH ALL APPLICABLE REGULATIONS</u>: Vendor agrees and covenants that the company, its agents and employees will comply with all city, county, state and federal codes, laws, rules and regulations

applicable to the business to be conducted under this contract. If the vendor performs any work knowing it to be contrary to such laws, ordinances, rules and regulations, the vendor shall bear all costs arising from such work.

- **3.9 CONTACT PERSONNEL:** Essential to the success of this Contract is the development of a good working relationship between the Vendor and Knox County. It is imperative that the Knox County account be handled efficiently and professionally. Knox County should be assigned no more than two (2) Vendor contacts to handle billing inquiries and service-related issues. In the event one or both contacts leave the Knox County account, the Vendor shall formally introduce the new contacts to Knox County personnel. These contacts must be knowledgeable of the Knox County account to avoid any interruption of service.
- **3.10 CONTRACT EXECUTION:** The award of this proposal may result in a Contract between Knox County and the successful Vendor(s). The Contract may require Board of Education and/or Knox County Commission approval. The successful Vendor(s) may be required to be present at the meeting(s) to answer questions relating to the service to be performed. Adequate notification will be given by Knox County Procurement Division if the awarded vendor(s) will need to attend meetings. There shall be no cost to Knox County for attendance of the Vendor(s). Knox County will draft the Contract. A sample contract is under Exhibit C for review. If a Contractor's Master Agreements, Service Agreements, Terms and Conditions or other contract agreements are submitted, they may not be accepted.
- 3.11 **CONTRACTOR DUTIES:** At the Contractor's own expense, the Contractor shall:
  - **3.11.1** Provide competent supervision;
  - **3.11.2** Provide competent personnel;
  - **3.11.3** Take precautions necessary to protect persons or property against injury or damage and be responsible for any such damage or injury that occurs as a result of their fault or negligence.
- 3.12 <u>CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORDS CHECK:</u> Any and all successful proposers, Contractor's employees, Contractor's sub-contractors and the employees of any sub-contractors must submit criminal history records check at the Contractor's expense, conducted by the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation and the Federal Bureau of Investigation prior to permitting the employee to have contact with students or enter school grounds when students are present. Reference Tennessee Code Annotated Section 49-5-413. Proposers must submit with their proposals the completed Attachment D Criminal History Affidavit of Compliance.
- **3.13 EVALUATION CRITERIA:** This proposal will be evaluated using the following criteria:

Each grade level band will be evaluated separately from the others and will be based off the following criteria for a total of 100 points per each grade level band. Bidders may bid on all grade level bands or any combination of grade level bands. There is no requirement that bidders bid on all grade level bands to be considered for award. As per Section 1.5, Knox County will determine the award structure that is in its best interest.

Knox County may select an Evaluation Committee for this solicitation to thoroughly review and score all submitted responsive and responsible proposals. Each evaluator will have the ability to award up to one hundred (100) points per grade level band, based on the Evaluation Criteria, per submission.

- **3.14 EVALUATION REVIEW:** Knox County reserves the right to use all pertinent information (including information learned from sources other than disclosed in the RFP process) that might affect the County's judgment as to the appropriateness of an award to the best evaluated Vendor(s). This information may be appended to the proposal evaluation process results. Information on a service provider from reliable sources, and not within the service provider's proposal, may also be noted and made part of the evaluation file. Knox County shall have sole responsibility for determining a reliable source. Knox County reserves the right to conduct written and/or oral discussions/interviews after the proposal closing. The purpose of such discussions/interviews is to provide clarification and/or additional information to make an award that is in the best interest of Knox County.
- **3.15 EXCEPTIONS TO SPECIFICATIONS:** Vendors taking exception to any part or section of these specifications shall indicate such exceptions within their submittal. A failure to indicate any exception(s) shall be interpreted as the Vendor's intent to fully comply with the specifications as written. Conditional or qualified offers are subject to rejection in whole or in part. Any exceptions shall be included in Section V, Tab VIII of the submittal. Do not strike through or in any other way alter the RFP. Exceptions listed within other sections of the submittal shall not be reviewed or considered.
- **3.16 <u>GRANT FUNDING</u>:** The products or services being procured under this solicitation are being funded by Federal Grant money. All awarded vendors will be required to adhere to Exhibit B of this solicitation in the performance of the Contract.
- **3.17 GRATUITIES AND KICKBACKS:** It shall be a breach of ethical standards for any person or company to offer, give, or agree to give any employee or former employee, or for any employee or former employee to solicit, demand, accept, or agree to accept from another person, a gratuity or an offer of employment in connection with any decision, approval, disapproval, recommendation, preparation of any part of a program requirement or a purchase request, influencing the content of any specification or procurement standard, rendering of advice, investigation, auditing or in any other advisory capacity in any proceeding or application, request for ruling, determination, claim, or controversy or other particular matter, pertaining to any program requirement of a contract or subcontract or to any solicitation or proposal therefore. It shall be a breach of ethical standards for any payment, gratuity or offer of employment to be made by or on behalf of a subcontractor under a contract to the prime contractor or higher tier subcontractor or a person associated therewith, as an inducement for the award of a subcontract or order. Breach of the provisions of this paragraph is, in addition to a breach of this Contract, a breach of ethical standards which may result in civil or criminal sanction and/or debarment or suspension from being a contractor or subcontractor under Knox County contracts.
- **3.18 IDENTIFICATION:** Employees of the Contractor must have proper photo identification displayed at all times while on property belonging to Knox County.
- **3.19 INSURANCE:** The successful Vendor(s) must carry the insurance as indicated on the Insurance Checklist Attachment hereto, along with any State required insurance. As proof of the Vendor's willingness to obtain and maintain the insurance, the Vendor must complete, sign and have its insurance agent sign Attachment B and submit it with the proposal. Upon the Notification of Intent to Award, the successful vendor will be required to submit a Certificate of Insurance (COI) including any corresponding endorsement page(s) with the specified coverage and listing Knox County as an additional insured. It shall be the successful vendor's responsibility to keep a current COI and endorsement page(s) on file with Knox County Procurement for as long as the contract is in effect.
- **3.20 INTERPRETATION:** No oral interpretation will be made to any vendor regarding the meaning of specifications or the Scope of Work. All questions are to be submitted in writing via email and will be answered in the form of an addendum to the solicitation by the Knox County Procurement Division, if applicable.
- **3.21** <u>INVOICE DETAIL:</u> Knox County is requesting invoices to show the following detail to help expedite review and payment. The Contractor(s) may be required to modify invoicing procedures to show the detail. All potential Contractors are hereby cautioned that Knox County will only pay from original invoices and not facsimiles or copies. Invoices which do not adhere to these details may be returned to the Contractor for correction.
  - The invoice must show the amount due to the Contractor by Knox County;
  - The invoice must show a summary of completed work;
  - Invoices are to be original and uniquely pre-numbered;
  - Invoices which do not show this information are subject to rejection.

**3.22 INVOICING PROCEDURES & PAYMENT SCHEDULE:** Knox County requests that invoices be easy to read and understand. Invoices are to be original and uniquely pre-numbered. There shall be no additional charge for this information and these procedures to be included. Each invoice shall include a summary of service(s) provided and shall list the associated unit price. Supporting documentation shall be included with invoices as applicable. Invoices without this information will be returned to the Contractor for correction.

Invoices shall be sent to the billing address indicated on the Purchase Order. Invoices must be submitted in triplicate and must match the corresponding Purchase Order number. Bidders are hereby notified that invoices may take up to thirty (30) days to process payment. There shall be no component billing. Mail invoices for Knox County Schools to:

**3.23 INVOICE REVIEW:** Knox County shall review all invoices for adherence to the terms and conditions of the Contract. Variations from the Contract and Contract pricing are strictly prohibited. Any variance found on the invoice will result in rejection of that invoice. Rejected invoices will be returned to the Contractor(s) for correction. Repeated variations may result in termination.

#### 3.24 MINIMUM QUALIFICATION EXPECTATIONS:

- **3.24.1** Respondent must address all submittal requirements as defined in Section V.
- **3.24.2** Respondent shall have a minimum of three (3) years of experience and sufficient capabilities to carry out the work contemplated, as well as the equipment and personnel available for the work.
- **3.24.3** A Knox County business license is not required of any Respondent or proposed sub-contractor or subconsultant who does not have a permanent office in Knox County. For more information, contact the Knox County Clerk's office at 865.215.2392.
- **3.25** <u>NEGOTIATION:</u> Knox County may select a successful proposer on the basis of initial offers received without discussions. Therefore, each proposal shall contain the proposer's best terms from a cost or price and service standpoint. Knox County reserves the right to enter Contract negotiations with the highest-rated proposer.

If Knox County and the selected proposer cannot negotiate a successful agreement, Knox County may terminate said negotiations and begin negotiations with the next highest-rated proposer. Knox County retains the right to negotiate with multiple proposers simultaneously. This process will continue until an agreement has been reached or all proposers have been rejected. No proposer shall have any rights against Knox County arising from such negotiations

- **3.26** <u>NEWS RELEASES BY VENDORS:</u> As a matter of policy, Knox County does not endorse the services of a Contractor. A Contractor will not make news releases concerning any resultant contract from this solicitation without the prior written approval of Knox County.
- **3.27 NO CONTACT POLICY:** After the date and time the proposer receives this solicitation, any contact initiated by any proposer with any Knox County representative, other than the Procurement Division representative listed herein, concerning this Request for Proposals is strictly prohibited. Any such unauthorized contact may cause the disqualification of the proposer from this procurement transaction.
- **3.28** OFFER WITHDRAWAL: No proposal can be withdrawn after it is filed unless the proposer makes a request in writing to the Knox County Procurement Division prior to the submission deadline or unless the County fails to accept within ninety (90) business days after the date fixed for the closing the Request for Proposals.
- **3.29 ORAL PRESENTATION/INTERVIEW:** Knox County may require proposers to give oral presentations/interviews in support of their proposal or to exhibit or otherwise demonstrate the information contained therein. Due to the conditions surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic, these presentations/interviews may be conducted virtually through video conferencing.

Knox County reserves the right to request oral presentations and/or interviews during the initial evaluation phase.

The County also reserves the right to complete the initial evaluation phase and then request oral presentations and/or interviews from all proposers or the highest rated proposers. In this case, the evaluations may be revised based on additional information received during presentations.

- **3.30** <u>PRICE:</u> The proposer(s) warrants that the price stated shall remain firm for a period of thirty-six (36) months from the first day of the original Contract period. If the Contractor's price is increased after the thirty-six (36) months, Knox County must be given a written notice to consider. Such a request shall include as a minimum, (1) the cause for the adjustment; (2) the amount of the change requested with documentation to support the requested adjustment. Price increases will only be considered at the renewal period(s) following the original thirty-six (36) months. If the price increase is rejected the contractor may:
  - Continue with the existing prices.
  - Request a lower price increase
  - Not accept the renewal offer.

If a price increase is approved by Knox County, the approval notification will be done in writing and the Contractor will be notified of the new price schedule and effective date of increase. This documentation will become part of the proposal file. No approvals will be authorized verbally.

- **3.31 PROPOSAL EVALUATION:** In evaluating the submitted proposals, Knox County reserves the right to use any or all of the ideas from the proposals submitted without limitation and to accept any part or the entire successful proposal in selecting an operation which is judged to be in the best interest of Knox County. All material submitted becomes property of Knox County.
- **3.32 PROPOSAL FORMAT:** This solicitation is in the Request for Proposals (RFP) format. At the specified date and time, each proposer's name will be publicly read aloud. No further information will be given at that time. Evaluation of the proposals will proceed as expeditiously as possible and successful, as well as unsuccessful, notification will be given.
- **3.33 PROPOSER OBLIGATION:** Proposers shall become fully acquainted with conditions relating to the scope of the work detailed in this RFP. Failure to become acquainted with the existing conditions shall in no way absolve the proposer of any obligations with respect to this RFP or the Contract.
- **3.34 PUBLIC RECORDS ACT:** Knox County is subject to the Tennessee Open Records Act 10-7-503 et seq. Proposers are cautioned that all documents submitted on behalf of this Request for Proposals shall be open to the public for viewing and inspection.
- **3.35 <u>QUANTITIES:</u>** Knox County does not guarantee any quantity of services will be utilized under this solicitation. Services will be utilized on an as needed basis.
- **3.36 REJECTION OF PROPOSALS:** Knox County reserves the right to reject any and all proposals received as a result of this request and to waive any informality, technical defect or clerical error in any proposal, as the interests of Knox County may require. Non-acceptance of any proposal will be devoid of any criticism of the proposal and of any implication that the proposal is deficient in any manner. Non-acceptance of any proposal shall be construed as meaning simply that the County does not deem the proposal acceptable or that another proposal was deemed more advantageous to Knox County for the particular services proposed.
- **3.37** <u>**REMOVAL OF CONTRACTOR'S EMPLOYEES:**</u> Contractor agrees to utilize only experienced, responsible and capable people in the performance of the work. Knox County may require that the Contractor remove from the job covered by this Contract, including employees who endanger persons or property or whose continued employment under this Contract is inconsistent with the interest of Knox County.
- **3.38** <u>SUBMIT QUESTIONS:</u> Prospective proposers may submit questions concerning this solicitation until April 14, 2023 at 4:30 p.m. local time. Submit questions as noted in Section 1.1.
- **3.39 SUSPENSION AND DEBARMENT:** Vendor will notify Knox County Government if they become suspended, debarred, or otherwise excluded from or ineligible for participation in Federal assistance programs or activities during the term of this bid and during the term of any subsequent contract for service.

#### 3.40 TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS FOR SOFTWARE RFPS:

Application should only utilize native browser-based technologies such as HTML and HTML5. No application utilizing third-party plugins will be considered (Examples of plugins include, but not limited to, Flash, Java, Silverlight, etc.)

No local caching server or software required or recommended. The vendor's application should scale as needed to support client demand.

Will support any modern OS, defined as the current publicly available version minus three versions. The most common Operating Systems used by KCS are: MacOS, ChromeOS, and Windows. As system updates become available, vendor to give KCS adequate notice of any foreseeable disruptions due to updates. \*\*Vendor is to also list any and/or all required plugins for full product functionality.

Will support current browser versions, defined as the current publicly available version minus three versions, for the following web browsers: Google Chrome, Safari, Microsoft Edge, Mobile Safari, Mobile Chrome. As browser updates become available, vendor to give KCS adequate notice of any foreseeable disruptions due to updates.

System must have user authentication using SAML, preferably Microsoft 365 SAML.

Data exchange from our SIS to vendor should be automated. Vendor will be responsible for processing any differencing (changes, updates) to vendor data based on the automated exchange.

KCS options for data exchange include Classlink OneRoster (preferred) or secure exchange of .csv files directly with vendor via SFTP transfer. KCS will not use Clever for data exchange.

Vendor must be in full compliance with FERPA, COPPA, and all applicable federal/state laws pertaining to student data privacy and governance.

#### 3.41 TECHNOLOGY RESTRICTIONS ON USE OF CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION:

Proposers must adhere to the following:

- 3.41.1 Any and all personally identifiable student or employee information including but not limited to name, address, telephone number, teachers, classes, grades, digital media and any other student or employee information of any kind is deemed confidential and shall not be released or disclosed in any form or manner unless authorized by District in writing. This restriction against release or disclosure also precludes sharing of data by Independent Contractor with any affiliate of Independent Contractor unless such sharing is expressly permitted under the contract or is expressly granted in writing by District. In addition, all information the release of which is prohibited by state or federal law or regulation, including but not limited to the protections of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (referred to herein as "FERPA") and all applicable laws of the State of Tennessee which is obtained by Independent Contractor from District, its students, faculty, or staff in the performance of this Agreement constitutes Confidential Information. Independent Contractor agrees to hold the Confidential Information in strictest confidence. Independent Contractor shall not use or disclose Confidential Information received from or on behalf of District or any of its students, faculty, or staff except as permitted or required by this Agreement, or otherwise as agreed in writing by District.
- 3.41.2 Independent Contractor agrees that any personally identifiable student data it obtains from the District shall only be used for the purpose of providing the contracted product or service to the District according to the terms of the contract. Independent Contractor may not sell student data. (This does not prevent transfer of student data by purchase or merger of the Independent Contractor, so long as the successor entity remains bound by and in compliance with the terms of this agreement.)
- 3.41.3 Independent Contractor may not use personally identified student data for any secondary purpose including targeted advertising. Independent Contractor may (a) use student data for adaptive learning or customized student learning processes; (b) market an educational application to a student's parent or guardian if Independent Contractor did not use student data shared by or collected on behalf of the District to do so; (c) use a recommendation engine within Independent Contractor's internal application to recommend learning or employment related content or services to the student, but only if the recommendation is not motivated by consideration from another party; (d) respond to a student request for information or feedback, but only if the response is not motivated by consideration from another party;

(e) use student data to allow or improve functionality of Independent Contractors' internal application; and (f) identify for the student nonprofit institutions of higher education or scholarship providers that are seeking students who meet specific criteria, but only if Independent Contractor obtains, through the District, the written consent of the student's parent or guardian (or the student if age 18 or older or emancipated). (Written consent may not be required in certain instances for an Independent Contractor which is a national assessment provider.)

- 3.41.4 Contractor agrees that it will protect the Confidential Information it receives according to commercially acceptable standards and no less rigorously than it protects its own Confidential Information. Specifically, Independent Contractor shall implement, maintain, and use appropriate administrative, technical, and physical security measures to preserve the confidentially, integrity, and availability of all electronically maintained or transmitted Confidential Information. Any data that is transmitted to/from District will be secure. Any electronic data stored by the vendor must be secure and backed up with a tested data recovery strategy in place as approved by District.
- 3.41.5 Within 30 days of termination, cancellation, expiration, or other conclusion of the contract, or within 30 days of a request by District with regard to any portion of the data, Independent Contractor shall return to District or if return is not feasible, destroy and not retain any copies of any and all Confidential Information that is in possession of Independent Contractor and certify in writing that all copies of the confidential information in its possession have been destroyed. This requirement shall not apply, and Independent Contractor may retain, personally identifiable student data if Independent Contractor has obtained written consent of the student's parent or guardian (or from the student if 18 or older or emancipated) and provides documentation of that consent to the District.
- 3.41.6 These obligations shall not apply to any information which (a) is already in the public domain through no breach of this Agreement, including but not limited to information available through schools' web site(s);
  (b) was lawfully in Independent Contractor's possession prior to receipt from an District school, its faculty staff or students; or (c) is received by Independent Contractor independently from a person or entity free to lawfully disclose such information other than an District school, its faculty, staff, or students.
- 3.41.7 Contractor warrants and represents that it shall, at all times, comply with the terms of this Agreement and with FERPA, COPPA, and all applicable laws of the state of Tennessee and further agrees not to disclose or re-disclose to any person or entity for any purpose whatsoever any personally identifiable student information as that term is defined by this agreement, FERPA, COPPA, or applicable laws of the state of Tennessee.
- 3.41.8 Independent Contractor agrees that District or its designee may, upon request, audit Independent Contractor to verify compliance with the applicable requirements of law.
- **3.42 <u>TENNESSEE REGISTRATION</u>: The successful proposer must meet any applicable State of Tennessee registration requirements.**

#### SECTION IV SCOPE OF SERVICES

#### 4.1 <u>SCOPE OF WORK:</u>

Knox County School district is seeking intervention programs and resources to increase student access to learning opportunities that address specific targeted skill gaps in numeracy.

#### PROJECT OVERVIEW:

Knox County Schools is seeking to partner with vendors who can provide intervention programs in the areas of mathematics for grades Pre-K-12<sup>th</sup> grade.

Supports need to align to the following:

• All components of the <u>Response to Instruction and Intervention Framework</u> from the Tennessee Department of Education.

Evidence-based research in foundational skills of numeracy should include but not be limited to the following areas: number sense fluency, math computation, and math reasoning. The vendor may provide consultation services, professional development and/or collaborative services for school staff. In addition, the vendor may provide instructional materials and/or programming for student and/or school staff use.

This Request for Proposals (RFP) outlines the scope of services and requirements that must be addressed by any vendor interested in providing intervention programs to increase student access to learning opportunities that address specific and targeted skill gaps in numeracy. Knox County and Knox County Schools requires each vendor to provide the following for each grade band in which they are interested in providing services: program content and methodology, delivery of services, experience implementing intervention programs and the specific team for the project. Professional development training for school staff with ongoing support is preferred, but not required. Training could include background information on why this approach is effective in teaching students to solve mathematical problems. Professional development may be provided face-to-face or virtually. The vendor is to provide all personnel, materials, equipment, and supervision necessary to provide the services detailed herein.

#### 4.2 BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Knox County Schools is composed of 92 schools with more than 7,800 staff supporting over 58,000 students.

Two of Knox County Schools' strategic plan goals are:

1) Increasing Student Achievement and

2) Eliminating Disparities. Providing students with evidence-based interventions in the area of numeracy can help to increase student achievement while also working to eliminate academic disparities.

Students scoring below the 25th percentile on the universal screener typically need extra intervention support. These interventions are needed for students to increase their proficiency in numeracy. Numeracy interventions should have a component of direct, explicit instruction and may include multisensory strategies. Knox County Schools desires to align interventions with specific student skill gaps.

For purposes of this RFP, definitions shall be as follows:

- <u>District</u>: The team from the central office that supports the school teams with numeracy implementation and intervention.
- <u>Tier 1:</u> The classroom where all students receive research-based, high-quality, general education instruction.
- <u>Tier 2:</u> Extra explicit instruction provided in small groups to students identified as "at risk" in basic math skills. This is in addition to Tier 1 instruction.
- <u>Tier 3</u>: Extra support provided in small groups to students who have not made significant progress in Tier 2 or who are significantly below grade level in basic math skills. Tier 3 interventions utilize more explicit and systematic instruction than Tier 2 making it more intensive. This is in addition to Tier 1 instruction.
- <u>ELL</u>: English Language Learners- a person who is learning the English language and has a native language that is not English.
- <u>Specialized Instruction</u>: The most intensive interventions and specially designed instruction to meet the unique needs of students identified with an educational disability.
- <u>Evidence-Based Research</u>: Any concept or strategy that is derived from or informed by objective evidence—most commonly, educational research or metrics of school, teacher, and student performance.
- <u>Student Information System</u>: It is a web-based platform that helps schools maintain student data online for easier management.
- <u>Number sense fluency:</u> Number sense fluency is the ability of students to be able to efficiently, flexibly, and accurately perform basic operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division) with whole numbers. To develop mastery of basic math fact fluency, students need experiences in developing number sense or in using numbers flexibly.
- <u>Rigor:</u> The result of student work that challenges student thinking in new and interesting ways. Rigor consists of conceptual understanding, procedural skill and fluency, and application.
  - <u>Conceptual Understanding</u>: Conceptual understanding refers to understanding mathematical concepts, operations, and relations. It is more than knowing isolated facts and methods. Students should be able to make sense of why a mathematical idea is important and the kinds of contexts in which it is useful. It also allows students to connect prior knowledge to new ideas and concepts.
  - Procedural Skill and Fluency: Procedural fluency is the ability to apply procedures accurately, efficiently, and flexibly. One cannot stop memorizing facts and procedures alone. It is about recognizing when one strategy or procedure is more appropriate to apply than another. Students need opportunities to justify both informal strategies and commonly used procedures through distributed practice. Procedural fluency includes computational fluency with the four arithmetic operations. In the early grades, students are expected to develop fluency with whole numbers in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. Therefore, computational fluency expectations are addressed throughout the standards. Procedural fluency extends students' computational fluency and applies to all strands of mathematics. It builds from initial exploration and discussion of number concepts to using informal strategies and the properties of operations to develop general methods for solving problems (NCTM, 2014).

<u>Application</u>: The application provides a valuable context for learning and the opportunity to practice skills in a relevant and meaningful way. As early as Kindergarten, students are solving simple "word problems" with meaningful contexts. In fact, it is in solving word problems that students are building a repertoire of procedures for computation. They learn to select an efficient strategy and determine whether the solution(s) makes sense. Problem-solving provides an important context in which students learn about numbers and other mathematical topics by reasoning and developing critical thinking skills (Adding It Up, 2001).

#### 4.3 FACILITIES:

Knox County Schools will provide all facilities for local training. Knox County School employees may also participate in formal training outside of Tennessee if necessary.

#### 4.4 PARTICIPANTS:

Participants in professional development will be staff members (teachers, administrators, district personnel, instructional coaches, counselors, etc.) serving our students. Professional development must be inclusive of training for hands on experiences with digital and physical instructional materials. The number of participants may vary. Vendors may work with an entire school/department staff, smaller school content teams and/or district teams, individuals, or any combination thereof. A defined number of training sessions or participants is not guaranteed.

#### 4.5 **PROGRAM CONTENT AND METHODOLOGY:**

- Knox County Schools is seeking vendor proposals for a comprehensive academic intervention system of support for the district and the schools to focus on foundational numeracy in Tier 1, Tier 2, Tier 3, specialized instruction and/or ELL (English Language Learners) instruction. Each intervention should be explicit and systematic. Supports need to align to the evidence-based research for identification and response to students who demonstrate skill gaps in foundational numeracy skills. All interventions may be aligned to address student-specific skill gaps.
- Math interventions should include number sense fluency, which is making sense of numbers, how numbers work together. The intervention may address conceptual understanding, procedural skill and fluency, and application and/or contain visual representations such as manipulatives, and/or models.

Respondents should articulate how they will provide a comprehensive academic intervention system of support for students and/or professional development for KCS staff to build foundational skills in numeracy for students in all tiers as well as students in specialized instruction.

The goal of Knox County Schools is to acquire intervention programs and resources to increase student access to learning opportunities that address specific targeted skill gaps in numeracy. Professional development for staff should address how to target specific skill gaps for individual students. Professional development for KCS staff should include training, not only on using the instructional materials but also on how the materials/intervention system are designed to strengthen a particular skill or concept.

Supports need to align to the evidence-based research on small group instruction to address specific skill gaps in the area of numeracy.

• Numeracy interventions could include number sense fluency (making sense of numbers & how numbers work together). The intervention may address/contain components that address some or all the following: conceptual understanding, procedural skills and fluency, application of skills in a meaningful context, visual representations such as manipulatives, and/or models.

The program should have the following components:

- Monitoring student progress is ongoing and is used to determine current instructional needs and next steps

This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this transaction was made or entered into and is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by 31 U.S.C. § 1352.

#### Procurement of recovered materials.

Contractors must comply with section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act. The requirements of Section 6002 include procuring only items designated in guidelines of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) at 40 CFR part 247 that contain the highest percentage of recovered materials practicable, consistent with maintaining a satisfactory level of competition, where the purchase price of the item exceeds \$10,000 or the value of the quantity acquired during the preceding fiscal year exceeded \$10,000; procuring solid waste management services in a manner that maximizes energy and resource recovery; and establishing an affirmative procurement program for procurement of recovered materials identified in the EPA guidelines.

Whereas, the County requested proposals for Numeracy Intervention Programs for Knox County Government and Knox County Schools (Request for Proposals #3398) and;

Whereas, Contractor submitted a bid in accordance with said requested specifications, the response of which is the most responsible and responsive bid meeting specifications accepted by the County;

Whereas, Contractor agrees and undertakes to provide said services for the County, as set forth in the Request for Proposals, and at the price quoted for said services by Contractor. Further, in accordance with the lawful directions of the County, the Contractor agrees in all respects, to be governed by the Request for Proposals' specifications and the Contractor's proposal and response.

**Now, therefore** in consideration of mutual covenants and promises contained herein, the parties hereto wish to enter into this Contract to set forth their respective rights and obligations and do mutually agree that; Arises

#### Witnesseth:

1. Terms of this Contract. This Contract commences on the  $\frac{1 \text{ st}}{1 \text{ st}}$  day of June 2023 and ends upon the  $\frac{31 \text{ st}}{31 \text{ st}}$  day of May 2024 unless terminated in conformity with the terms of this Contract as contained in paragraphs 4 and 5. The County intends to issue a one-year (1) award. Upon the mutual agreement of the vendor and the County, the award may be extended for four (4) additional years, one (1) year at a time. This may result in a total of five (5) years. The County reserves the right to purchase these goods/services from other sources if the need arises. The County reserves the right to revoke the award if a pattern of unavailability with the vendor.

2. **Payment.** The County shall pay Contractor the amount as agreed upon in the County's Request for Proposals for Numeracy Intervention Programs per the Contractor's response to Request for Proposals #3398; pursuant to all payments being subject to the County's review and approval. The Contractor shall receive, upon the need of the County, written notification to proceed. The Contractor shall pursue all work diligently until completion as directed by the County.

**3. Invoicing and reporting requirements.** Contractor shall invoice the County for Numeracy Intervention Programs and Services pursuant to Request for Proposals #3398.

**4. Termination.** The County may terminate this Contract with or without cause, upon written notice of not less than thirty (30) days. Upon termination, the County will pay for services satisfactorily completed but not yet invoiced. Contractor shall not perform additional work without the expressed permission of the County.

**Should the Contractor** fail to provide Numeracy Intervention Programs and Services detailed herein, the County will communicate the problem(s) to the Contractor both verbally and in writing and keep a written record as to what the problem(s) are and when the Contractor was contacted. The Contractor shall rectify the problem within thirty (30) business days of notification of the problem. If the same or other problems persist or reoccur, the County may terminate the Contract.

In the event Contractor intends to interrupt or discontinue service under this Contract, Contractor agrees to give the County at least one hundred twenty (120) day advance written notice of said interruption or discontinuance of service prior to interrupting or discontinuing same. Any interruption or discontinuance of service without said advance notice shall constitute a material breach of this Contract.

5. **Appropriations.** In the event no funds are appropriated by the County for Numeracy Intervention Programs and Services in any fiscal year or insufficient funds exist to provide the services, then the Contract shall expire upon the

expenditure of previously appropriated funds or the end of the current fiscal year, whichever occurs first, with no further obligations owed to or by either party.

6. **Independent contractor.** Contractor acknowledges that Contractor and employees serve as independent contractors and that the County shall not be in any manner responsible for any payment, insurance, or incurred liability.

7. Compliance with all federal, state, and municipal laws. Contractor is assumed to be familiar with and agrees to observe and comply with all federal, state, and local laws, statutes, ordinances, and regulations in any manner affecting the provision of the Numeracy Intervention Programs and Services, and all instructions and prohibitive orders issued regarding this work and shall obtain all necessary permits.

**8. Severability clause.** If any provision of this Contract is declared illegal, void, or unenforceable the remaining provisions shall not be affected but shall remain in force and in effect.

**9. Prohibition against assignment.** Contractor shall not assign this Contract to any party, company, partnership, incorporation, or person without prior specific written consent of the County.

**10.** This Contract shall be exclusively construed, governed, and controlled by the Laws of the State of Tennessee without regard to principles of law, including conflicts of law, of any other jurisdiction, territory, country, and/or province. Any dispute arising out of or relating to this agreement shall exclusively be brought in the Chancery Court or the Circuit Court of Knox County, Tennessee. Each party consents to personal jurisdiction thereto and waives any defenses base on personal jurisdiction, venue and inconvenient form.

**11. Right to inspect.** The County reserves the right to make periodic inspections of the manner and means the services are performed.

12. Nondiscrimination and non-conflict statements. Contractor agrees that no person on the grounds of handicap, age, race, color, religion, sex, national origin or any individual trait or characteristic found to be an illegal consideration, shall be excluded from participation in, or be denied benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the performance of this Contract, or in the employment practices of Contractor. Contractor shall upon request show proof of such non-discrimination and shall post in conspicuous places available to all employees and applicants notices of non-discrimination.

**13. Books and records.** Contractor shall maintain all books, documents, accounting records and other evidence pertaining to the service under this Contract and make such materials available at their offices at all reasonable times during the contract period and for three (3) years from the date of the final payment under the Contract for inspection by the County or by any other governmental entity or agency participating in the funding of this Contract, or any authorized agents thereof; copies of said records to be furnished if requested. Such records shall not include those books, documents and accounting records that represent the Contractor's costs of manufacturing, acquiring or delivering the products and services governed by this Contract.

**14. Contractor** shall indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless, County, its officers, agents and employees from all suits, claims, actions or damages of any nature brought because of, arising out of, or due to breach of the Contract by Contractor, its subcontractors, agents or employees or due to any negligent act, occurrence, omission, commission of Contractor, its subcontractors, agents, or employees.

**15. Delivery.** Contractor shall render the Numeracy Intervention Programs and Services for the County in accordance with Request for Proposals #3398.

**16. Tax Compliance.** Pursuant to Resolution R-07-1-903 passed by the Commission of Knox County, Tennessee, Contractor hereby acknowledges, by submission of its bid and signature that it is current in its respective Federal, State, County, and City taxes of whatever kind or nature and is not delinquent in any way. Delinquent status must be disclosed or risk debarment by the Knox County Procurement Division.

**17. Limitations of liability.** In no event shall the County be liable for any indirect, incidental, consequential, special or exemplary damages or lost profits, even if the County has been advised of the possibility of such damages

**18. Contract documents.** It is mutually agreed by both parties that the following documents are made part of this Contract and are incorporated herein by reference:

- A. Request for Proposals #3398
- B. Contractor's Response to Request for Proposals #3398

It is agreed that this Contract, represents the **entire Contract** between the parties and no prior representations, promises, and agreements, oral or otherwise, not embodied herein, shall be of any force or effect.
